How to Insert References and Citations in Microsoft Word

Learning Objectives

By the end of this tutorial, students will be able to:

- 1. Insert and manage citations using Microsoft Word's References tab.
- 2. Create a bibliography automatically.
- 3. Apply Harvard or Vancouver citation styles.

Part 1 – Understanding Citations and References

A citation is a short reference in the text showing the source of information.

Example: Enzymes play an important role in digestion (Smith, 2020).

A bibliography or reference list is a list of all the sources cited in the text.

Example: Smith, J. (2020). Principles of Biochemistry. Oxford University Press.

Part 2 – How to Insert a Citation in Microsoft Word

Step 1: Open Microsoft Word. Go to the top menu bar and click References.

Step 2: Click 'Insert Citation' and choose 'Add New Source...'.

Step 3: Fill in Source Information (Author, Title, Year, Publisher, etc.); choose the type of the document if the book; article or.....

Step 4: Insert the citation in the text by selecting 'Insert Citation' again.

Part 3 – How to Create a Bibliography

- 1. Place the cursor at the end of your document.
- 2. Click Bibliography or References in the References tab.
- 3. Choose a style (Bibliography or Works Cited).

Word will automatically generate the full list of references used in the text.

Part 4 – Choosing a Citation Style

In the References tab, you can select Harvard or Vancouver citation style from the Style drop-down menu.
