<i>If I have time I will visit you.</i>
<i>If I had more time I would travel the world.</i>
<i>If I had had time I would have gone to the football match</i>

## Definition and types of conditiona

to talk about things that are possible, you often use if in a sentence. A sentence with if is called a **conditional sentence** .

The table below explain the different types of conditional situations:

TYPE	IF-CLAUSE	MAIN CLAUSE	USE	EXAMPLES
<b>0</b>	<b>- PRESENT SIMPLE</b>	<b>- PRESENT SIMPLE</b>	<b>Pure fact</b>	Water turns into ice if it gets cold.
<b>1 PROBAB LE CONDITI ON</b>	<b>if + PRESENT SIMPLE</b>	<b>- FUTURE SIMPLE - IMPERATIVE - MODAL VERB + INFINITIVE</b>	real present real or very probable situation in the present or future.	If he comes late, we'll miss the train. If you don't have enough money, don't buy it.
<b>2 IMPROBA BLE CONDITI ON</b>	<b>if + PAST SIMPLE</b>	<b>- WOULD + BARE INFINITIVE - COULD + BARE INFINITIVE - MIGHT + BARE INFINITIVE - SHOULD + BARE INFINITIVE</b>	unreal present improbable situation in the present or future also used to give advice	If I had money, I would buy a new car (but I don't have enough money) If I were you, I would see a doctor. Would you run away if you saw a ghost?
<b>3 IMPOSSIB LE CONDITI ON</b>	<b>if + PAST PERFECT</b>	<b>- WOULD HAVE + P. PARTICIPLE - COULD HAVE + P. PARTICIPLE - MIGHT HAVE + P. PARTICIPLE - SHOULD HAVE +P PARTICIPLE</b>	unreal past unreal or improbable situation in the past also used to express regret and criticism	If you hadn't been rude, your boss wouldn't have fired you (but you were rude and he fired you) She would have passed the exam if she had studied.
