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Reported Speech (Indirect Speech)

What is reported speech?

Reported speech: is when you tell somebody else what you or another person said before.

A. Reporting Statements:

- When transforming statements, check whether you have to change: **pronouns**, **tenses**, **places** and **time** expressions.
- **1- Pronouns**: In reported speech, you often have to change the pronoun depending on who says what .**Example**: She says, "My father works in Italy." She says that her father works in Italy.
- **2- Tenses: a.** If the sentence starts in the **present**; there is **no backshift** of tenses in reported speech.
- **B** .If the sentence starts in the past; there is often backshift of tenses in reported speech.

No backshift: Do not change the tense if the introductory clause is in a present tense (e. g. <u>He says</u>). Example: He <u>says</u>, "I <u>write</u> poems." – He <u>says</u> that he <u>writes</u> poems.

Backshift: You must change the tense if the introductory clause is in a past tense (e. g. <u>He said</u>). Example: He <u>said</u>, "I <u>am</u> rich." – He <u>said</u> that he <u>was</u> rich.

Examples of the main changes in tense:

⁻The modal verbs *could, should, would, might, needn't, ought to, and used to* do not change. Example: He said, "She **might** be right." – He said that she **might** be right.

Other modal verbs may change:

Model	Direct speech	Reported speech
Can	"I can do it."	He said he could do it
May	" May I go out?"	He wanted to know if he might go out.
Must	"She must apply for the job."	He said that she must/had to apply for the job.
Will	"They will call you."	He told her that they would call her.

3- Place, demonstratives and time expressions

In the following table, you will find the different changes of time expressions; demonstratives and place.

B. Reporting Questions: also note that you have to:

- transform the question into an indirect question
- use the question word (where, when, what, how) or if / whether

Types of questions	Direct speech	Reported speech
With question word (what,	"Why" don't you speak	He asked me why I didn't speak
why, where, how)	English?"	English.
Without question word (yes or	"Do you speak English?"	He asked me whether / if I spoke
no questions		English.

C. Reporting requests / commands and negative requests:

Direct speech	Reported speech
"Nancy, do the exercice."	He told Nancy to do the exercise.
She said ,"don't be lazy"	She asked me not to be lazy
"Nancy, give me your pen, please."	He asked Nancy to give him her pen.

D. Other transformations:

•	Expressions of advice with must, should and	d ought are usually reported using <i>advise</i> /	' urge.
	Example: "You must read this book	."He advised / urged me to read that bo	ok.

- The expression **let's** is usually reported using *suggest*. In this case, there are two possibilities for reported speech: gerund or statement with *should*.
- Example:

"Let's go to the cinema." 1. He **suggested going** to the cinema.

2. He **suggested** that we **should** go to the cinema.
