MODAL VERBS

Modals are those helping verbs, which express the 'mode' or 'manner' of the actions indicated by the main verbs. They express modes such as ability, possibility, probability, permission, obligation, etc.

The most commonly used modals are shall, should, will, would, can, could, may, might, must, have to, ought to, used to, need and dare.

Modals are used to:

• Ask permission—may, can, could

Examples: May I come in?

Could I use your pen, please?

Make a request—can, could, would

Example: <u>Could</u> you please give me the doctor's telephone number?

Make an offer _would

Example: would you like some fries with that?

Make Conditional sentences _would

Example: I would wait, if I were you.

• Express a possibility—may, might, could

Example: It might rain during the night.

• **Give advice or suggestion**—should

Example: You should wear a helmet while riding your motorbike.

• **Express necessity or compulsion**—must, have to

Examples: We <u>must</u> slow down while driving in front of a school.

I have to submit my project by tomorrow.

Express prohibition

Example: You <u>must not</u> talk loudly in the library.

Express a promise or intention—will, shall

Example: I will mail you my address.

• Express a wish—may

Example: May you have a long life!

A modal does not change according to the number or person of the subject.

Examples: He <u>can</u> learn. I <u>can</u> learn. You <u>can</u> learn.

They <u>can</u> learn. We <u>can</u> learn.

A modal is always used with a verb in its basic form. The modal takes the tensewhile the main verb remains in its dictionary form.

Examples: I <u>can</u> run. I <u>may</u> run.

I <u>could</u> run. I <u>might</u> run.

Modals can be used alone in response to a question.

Examples: Can you sing? I can.

Will you sing? I will.

Will you come? I may / I will.

Modals, when joined with 'not' to form a negative, can be contracted.

Examples: I cannot run. I <u>can't</u> run.

I do not run. I <u>don't</u> run. I <u>won't</u> run.
